## Igniting Innovation and Research



Despite the demands of the pandemic, nurses continued to use innovation and research in 2021 to advance quality care. The challenges of COVID-19 required creativity and problem-solving like never before, and Texas Health nurses were up to the task. Plus, nurses developed and used their research skills to study the impact of the pandemic on patient care.

Christine Elling, a member of the inaugural class of Texas Health's Health Science Fellowship, conducted research on the impact of visitor restrictions on the perceptions of postpartum women and nurses, as well as the impact on selected outcomes immediately after birth.

Patients in the study were disappointed in their children not being able to come meet their new sibling in the hospital, and some women were frustrated that their mother was not able to be there for the birth. On the positive side, patients stated that they appreciated the time to bond as a new family unit without the distractions of visitors. My hope is that the study results will help guide leaders in implementing visitation policies in the future."













Percentage of patients who answered that their nurses "always":







The largest construction project in the history of the Texas Health system, the nine-story bed tower will add 144 patient beds, 15 surgical suites, and new pre-operative and post-operative services

areas. Nurses played keyed roles on four workgroups, supporting the physical design of the building, selecting new equipment, creating training and education, and planning for moving departments and patients. "Nurses have great insight on the most efficient and safest ways to care for patients, so their input has been vital," said Debbie Phillips, M.S., R.N., FNP-C, NE-BC, associate chief nursing officer. The tower is scheduled to open in April 2022.

airway management, which provided a team intubation strategy, and implemented a Safer Airway checklist. By the second quarter of 2021, 100% of hospital departments had implemented Safer Airway procedures and standardized crash carts. The project has made a significant impact on improving patient care: While the hospital experienced six airway events in the first quarter of 2020, the hospital had zero events in the second quarter of 2021.
